In a move that caught most observers by surprise the PGA Tour, the DP World Tour and the Saudi investment fund (PIF) that owns LIV Golf have agreed to create a new overarching golf entity to oversee and manage professional golf.

Whilst it looks like there will be no change to each tour's schedule for 2023 there are a lot of uncertainties about how professional men's golf will look in 2024. All legal action between the tours has stopped as a result of this move saving buckets of cash in legal fees. The on course future of players who defected

to LIV and were fined and stripped of membership on the regular tours is uncertain. The players who stayed loyal (Rory McIlroy!) to the regular tours and passed on the big LIV \$s must be wondering why they bothered!

Recent Results

 Grade. Michael Kent (40pts A Grade) and Pat Maginness (39pts B Grade) won the other grades and Liz Mitchell won the Women's Division on a countback from Ruth Branagh after both scored 38pts.
- The Ray Fraser Pairs Aggregate competition on 15/4 was postponed due to problems with the competition set up in MiScore.
- The round on 22/4 was a tale of two countbacks. The overall and all three men's grades were won with the same score 38pts. James Mackie got the overall on a countback but at least the others got some reward. Hiroshi Tetsuhito (A Grade), James Staib (B Grade) and Leigh Busby (C Grade) got the prizes. The story was different in the Women's Division. Fiona Reynolds (32 pts) took win but Lynda Doutch and Linda Best missed out on prize as they were in the same division as Fiona.
- Kurtley Brandt scorched the course for 44pts on 29/4 to win the overall. Alan Wright's 40pts won A Grade and Grant Nicholson (34pts). James Mackie backed up his win from the previous week to win B Grade with 39pts. Linda Best (37pts) bounced back from missing out the previous week to win the Women's Division.
- George Bakrnchev took out May's VGL Medal and A Grade with a net 62. The best scores of the day came from two visitors with James Walkinghsaw taking the overall from Garrick Rollason on a countback after both scored net 61s. Garrick took the C Grade title. Jenni Clarke (net 69) won the Women's Division and Clayton Ford won C Grade with a net 64.

Course management will again start play from the 10th tee during June. This will become a regular feature over winter months as a large proportion of play is 9 holes.

Winter is starting to impact golf operations across many courses. Recently we have had wet weather and fog hamper our regular competitions and it is worth noting some rules that apply in these instances.

Course management will decide at any point how they manage the impact of weather on course operations and player safety. This can include setting barriers to manage waterlogged areas, excluding the use of carts, halting play until conditions such as fog or lightning clears or closing the course in the event of extreme heat or bushfires.

In all instances, these decisions must be observed. When play is halted or the course is closed you must stop play and seek shelter. If you continue to play, you are in breach of the rules of golf, you are not covered by insurance and risk being banned from the course.

That being said, golf is one of the great all year sports and there is plenty of equipment that will keep you warm and dry. So stock up on hand warmers, make sure you pack an umbrella and if it all gets too much, head north with a few mates.

Signs of life in LIV?

Note this story is a bit redundant after the breaking news on Page 1 but here it is anyway...

After looking like life might be short LIVed for a while there LIV golf received a boost both on and off the course in the last few months. Off course the LIV Adelaide and LIV Singapore events generated plenty of crowds and excitement.

On the course was even better with LIV golfers defying pundit's predictions in the two major tournaments conducted so far in 2023. Many had predicted that the limited LIV schedule and lack of top class competition would have the LIV players behind the 8 ball in the majors. However three LIV golfers were in the top 4 at the Masters – Brooks Koepka and Phil Michelson tied 2nd and Patrick Reed tied 4th. And then Koepka went out and won the PGA Championship with Bryson DeChambeau tied 4th and Can Smith tied 9th.

Look out for the upcoming US Open starting next week 15 June at the Los Angeles Country Club – looks an amazing course!

The Rise of Rose

On the LPGA side all the talk has been about the rising star Rose Zhang. Zhang won her second national collegiate title (NCAA Division 1) in May

and then turned professional. In her first event as a professional she not only competed against a very strong field but won the event



in a playoff with major winner Jennifer Kupcho. Amazingly in her last 12 stroke play events Zhang has won 10 and tied 5th and tied 12th in the other two. The 10 wins include the LPGA event and the national women's amateur event at Augusta.

More on Handicaps – from Michael Kent

Under the current formula for determining a handicap, golfers don't often play to their handicap. The first step in determining a player's GA Handicap is to average the best 8 of their most recent 20 rounds; the second and final step is to multiply this average by 0.93.

The result? In a Stableford competition you will only play to your handicap about 15% of the time.

In summary - the golfing gods don't hate you, they are just unemotional statisticians.

To prove the point here are some of concepts those straight laced stats gurus are wrestling with:

- Consistency. Generally low handicappers are more consistent than high handicappers and high handicappers often have clusters of good scores which can cause a problem when they drop out of the calculation.
- Using an average of the last 20 scores (instead of the best 8 out of 20) would advantage high handicappers
- Again the 0.93 multiplier has been shown to provide more equity reducing the advantage for high handicappers
- Finding a balance between how quickly a handicap changes e.g. if only 6 out of 20 were used handicaps would be very volatile.
- Under the current system handicaps increase 50% more slowly than they reduce
 Bottom line they say that if you score 36pts you will have played to your handicap!

Vale Mark Heynemann

Mark also had a Hole in One on the old 7^{th} hole in December 2015.

Rules to Avoid Becoming an Ancient Golfer

Discovered by Sandy Club Treasurer Christine Nicholson just before they were placed in the shredder at the R & A we present their Rules to Avoid Becoming an Ancient Golfer. Disclaimer: When asked for comment the R& A denied the existence of any such rules.

- Rule 1 Do not grunt or groan when retrieving ball from hole or general bending over Failure to comply One Stroke Penalty
- Rule 2 No muttering or talking to oneself Failure to comply – One Stroke Penalty
- Rule 3 Avoid the use of arms to assist in standing up from crouched or seated position Failure to comply One Stroke Penalty
- Rule 4 Walk in purposeful manner no shuffling Failure to comply – One Stroke Penalty
- Rule 5 Ensure any spectacles are free from detritus which would otherwise impair vision Failure to comply – One Stroke Penalty
- Rule 6 Keep dementia in check to enable correct scoring Failure to comply – General Penalty = 2 Strokes
- Rule 7 Refrain from unexpected breaking of wind or taking relief behind a bush Failure to comply Penalty: Loss of Hole
- Rule 8 Severe breach of Rule 7
 Failure to comply Disqualification

Satchel Paige's Six Rules for Staying Young.

By contrast (or maybe thinking about it) on the same theme. Satchel Paige was a black American baseball pitcher who spent most of his astonishingly long career playing in black only leagues. After Jackie Robinson broke Major League baseball's colour ban in 1947 Paige was the 7th black player to play in the Major Leagues. He made his Major League debut at the ripe old age of 42 and played his last professional game at just short of his 60th birthday – so maybe there is something to his six rules! Here they are:

- 1. Avoid fried meats which angry up the blood
- 2. If your stomach disputes you, lie down and pacify it with cool thoughts.
- 3. Keep the juices flowing by jangling around gently as you move
- 4. Go very light on the vices such as carrying on in society. The social ramble ain't restful.
- 5. Avoid running at all times
- 6. Don't look back. Something might be gaining on you.

The 5 X 5 Rule

The 5x5 rule states that if you come across an issue take a moment to think whether or not it will matter in 5 years. If it won't, don't spend more than 5 minutes stressing out about it. When your problems need to be put into perspective, the 5x5 rule is a good thing to remember.

Know your golf stats – a Fairway News long read plus a picture of Brad Pitt The rise of sports stats

Advanced stats seem to be taking over all professional sports. In AFL you get contested possessions, clangers and clearances to name a few. USA based sports are particularly stats driven with baseball leading the way (Baseball is full of statistics and there is even a word for a baseball statistician – a sabermetrician). Baseball even has a stat called WAR – wins above replacement that supposedly measures how many wins an individual player contributes to the team compared with a replacement player.

You can also probably blame it all on Moneyball! Moneyball was the name given to the stats

driven approach adopted by Billy Beane the GM of the Oakland Athletics baseball team in the US. He used advanced stats on individual players and situations to recruit certain players and design game strategies that went against traditional baseball wisdom. Oakland had some success and the approach was adopted by other teams and is credited with helping the Boston Red Sox win their first World Series for 86 years in 2004. Also it was made into a Hollywood movie with Brad Pitt playing Billy!



The ready availability of match and player statistics have also fuelled the burgeoning growth of fantasy competitions and, regrettably, betting options. (None of that sponsorship here!)

Golf stats (MLNA Rated - medium level nerd alert)

In golf we have the traditional stats - fairways hit, greens in regulation, putts per green, sand saves, scrambling %s etc. but now if you follow the professional men's game you will have heard of the "Shots Gained" stat.

Taking advantage of the *Shotlink* tool (which measures each shot to an accuracy of 1 inch) used on all PGA events a Columbia Business School professor - Mark Broadie, created a new set of statistics based on the concept of "Strokes Gained". The Shotlink data enables the calculation of the average number of shots taken by a tour player to finish a hole from a given distance. For example, on average PGA Tour pros take 1.5 shots to complete a hole from 8-feet, meaning they 1-putt 50% of the time and 2-putt 50% of the time. With this dataset any shot can be compared relative to the shot's start point and endpoint.

Here's an example. A golfer stands on the tee of long par 3 where *Shotlink* says the average number of shots taken to complete this hole is 3.2. The player hits their tee shot to 16-feet, leaving a putt for birdie. The PGA Tour average to complete the hole from the tee was 3.2. The average strokes taken to complete the hole from their new location (16 feet) is 1.8. **3.2 – 1.8 = 1.4**

The tee shot has placed them 1.4 stokes closer to completing the hole. After you subtract the one shot they have used to get to that spot the result is a Strokes Gained measure of 0.4 on that shot: 3.2 - 1.8 = 1.4 - 1 = 0.4 SG.

Generally the formula is: (Average no. of shots taken to get in the hole from the start position) – (Average no. of shots taken to get in the hole from the finish position) – 1.

Get it? Got it? Good! *

Know your golf stats – Fairway News long read Part 2

Here's a driving example. According to *Shotlink* data, PGA pros take an average of 4.17 shots to complete a 460-yard par four. *Shotlink* also says that pros take on average 3.19 shots to complete a hole from the fairway at 200 yards. Consequently, if a pro hits their tee shot 260-yards and lands in the fairway, leaving 200 yards they will have lost 0.02 shots to the field. **4.17 – 3.19 = 0.98 – 1 = -0.02 SG. BUT...**

If he drives the ball so there is only 140 yards left the average no of shots taken to hole out from 140 yards is only 2.91 and the Stokes Gained calculation is 4.17 - 2.91 = 1.26 - 1 = +0.26 SG. The drive gains 0.26 SG.

This just sound like common sense but the metrification of the process has helped to drive the obsession with distance particularly in someone like the golf professor Bryson DeChambeau.

Can you use Stroke Gained in your own game?

A number of apps and devices enable the amateur golfer to also track their shots and work out where they are gaining or losing shots against the average. This can help with on course strategy and designing practice routines. Some of the ones that come up are Arccos, Shotscope, Garmin SwingU, Decade and GolfShot has promised one for later this year. There seems to be a lot of variation in cost (upfront, subscription), method of collecting data(some require sensors to be attached to your clubs), tech (some can be paired with an Apple Watch for instance) and output. What's it mean?

To finish here is some food for thought from both some traditional stats and the strokes gained perspective. It seems that the average PGA Tour player will hole less than 1 in 3 putts from 3 to 4.6m and under 1 in 5 putts from 4.6 to 6m. Don't feel too bad next time you miss a 2m putt!

In the most recent PGA tournament world No 1 Scottie Scheffler finished tied for 3rd. For the tournament he was No1 in Strokes Gained Tee to Green, Off the Tee and Approach. He was 10th in Strokes Gained Around the Green but was 59th in Strokes Gained Putting losing 1.46 shots to the field on the greens and more than 3 shots to the players who finished ahead of him. He lost by 1 shot! I think we know were his practice efforts will be directed!
