Recent Results (cont.)

- Visitor Alessio Caneschi streeted the field with a net 56 on the 1/3 to win the overall. Adam Canwell (net 60) won the VGL Medal and B Grade. Two net 61s took out B and C Grades with Brennan Graves and Marcus Edwards saluting the judges.
- Countbacks can be cruel as Allister Lahood found out on 8/3. Three players scored 41pts with Paul McGarry winning the overall and Kevin Wong winning B Grade and Allister missing out as he was in the same Grade as Kevin. Christine Nicholson(36pts) won the Women's Division from Jenni Clarke on a countback. Ashley O'Sullivan (40pts A Grade) and Tony Turpin (35pts C Grade) were the other winners.
- Starting with 8 straight pars Cris Payne blitzed the field to win the overall on 15/3 with a +8. Once again B Grade was a tight finish with 4 players scoring +2. Ned Brennan got the nod on countback from Russell Jones, Shaun Paljakka and Grant Nicholson. Sarah Adam-Gedge (+2 Women's Division), Sean Paterson (+4 A Grade) and Tony Morgan(+3 C Grade) were the other winners.
- Cris Payne continued his great form when he paired with Craig Brenner to win the 2ball Ambrose on 22/3 with a score of 56.5. They only just got over the line from Deep Sareen and Clayton Ford who shot 56.75.
- Lucy Toomey set a new Women's Saturday course record with a brilliant 46pts on 29/3. Yufang Mao's 41pts was next best and won C Grade. Deep Sareen (40pts B Grade) and Allister Lahood (39pts A Grade) were the other winners. Deep continuing his good form after a runner up finish the previous week and Allister getting some redemption after missing out on a countback a few weeks earlier.

CAPTAIN'S CORNER

In this report I want to focus on some local rules for our club. A copy can be found on the scorecard, via the MiScore app or the club website. I suggest everyone should refresh their memory, especially if they are playing in the pennant or club Matchplay events.



Our course has a lot of bunkers for a public facility. Some have rakes, others do not. Some look like "sandy wastes" and others are treated as access paths. If you find yourself in a prepared sand area, it is a bunker. You have to play the ball as it lies or take a penalty. There are some exceptions under the rules of golf, so unless you know them, there is no free relief.

GUR, gardens and paths. Unless the course specifically has a sign noting an area as GUR, or a continuous white line or rope circling an area, then you play the ball as it lies. All the "new vegetation areas" with a free drop are gone at the time of this newsletter. Gardens, paths and other no play zones are listed in the local rules.

Knowing the rules is easy, and sure beats the embarrassment of being called out on a breach.

If you make a mistake, take the penalty and play on the short stuff, it's a lot more fun.

Competition News Match Play Competitions

LG McDonald Trophy

The first round for the LG McDonald Trophy will be played on 5 April. Royal Melbourne Clinics a hit! New clinic dates now available

The Club subsidised lessons at Royal Melbourne have been received very positively. Eighteen members in groups of 6 attended three 1 ½ hour sessions with Ryan McCarthy in February. Each session focused on a different area – driving and iron play, chipping and bunker play and putting. The structure of the sessions allowed plenty of time for one-on-one tuition as well as testing the advice by hitting plenty of balls.

Ryan mixed a little theory with practical advice tailored to each member's game. As one member said his approach was "engaging and very helpful".

Club Champion

Two were tied at the top after Round 1 with Andy Moratis and Tim Noonan both shooting 71s. They led by 2 from defending Champion Craig Brenner. Andy followed his 71 with a 72 to take a 2 shot lead over Tim (74) with Craig (76) a further 4 back. In the third round Craig shot the best round of the Championship a 70 but it wasn't enough to close the gap as Andy's ultra consistent 73 saw him take the title by 3 shots. Tim (80) slipped back into 3rd

Congratulations to Andy on his first Club Championship title.

B Grade

Three time Champion Paul Scanlon opened brilliantly in the B Grade Championship. Paul's 80 led by 2 from Dale Gilkes (who did not play the subsequent rounds) and by 3 from Ruth Branagh and Russell Jones. Scott Reed and Sarah Adam-Gedge were on 84. Paul (83) maintained his lead after Round 2. Russell Jones (82) was 2 shots back with Scott Reed (83) two shots further behind. It turned into a 2-horse race in the third round with Russell (84) closing the gap on Paul (86) to tie the score on 249. Countback rules for the CCs take the best scores on the back nine over the three rounds and this gave Russell the title leaving Paul lamenting a disaster on the 17th in the second round.

Congratulations to Russell on his first B Grade Championship!

C Grade

Tony Morgan stamped his authority on the C Grade Championship with an opening 90. He led by 2 from Fiona Reynolds (who did not play the subsequent rounds) and by 5 from Jenni Clarke. A 2nd round 95 gave Tony a 6-shot lead from Ross Gordon whose 91 improved drastically on his opening 100. Jenni (98) was 2 shots further back. No one could close the gap in Round 3 and Tony (96) won the title by 7 shots from Ross (97) and Jenni (95) who tied for second.

Congratulations to Tony on his second C Grade Championship in the last three years.

Ladies Open

Kate Caridakis was going for a hat trick of wins and her opening round 74 made it very difficult for anyone to catch her. She led by 8 from Dale Gilkes (who did not play the subsequent rounds) and by 9 from Ruth Branagh (83). Kate gave her pursuers some hope when she shot 81 in the 2nd round, but her lead increased to 15 shots from Ruth (87). Anna Puchalski (86) was a shot further back. Kate's final round 81 saw her to a comfortable victory over Sarah Adam-Gedge whose consistent scoring (84, 89, 88) saw her move past Ruth (98) and Anna (94) to take second place Congratulations to Kate on winning her third consecutive Ladies Open Championship.

President's Trophy

Andy Moratis led the President's Trophy (best net score in the CCs) from go to whoa. Andy's opening 61 gave him a three shot lead from Gary Gibb, Paul Scanlon and Tim Noonan who all shot 64. Despite losing a shot off his handicap Andy's 63 gave him a 5 shot lead from Russell Jones (65,64) and 6 shots from Gary Gibb (66). Andy's consistency won the day with his 64 giving him an 8 shot victory from Russell (67) and 10 shots over Gary (68). Andy's score of 188 was also a new President's Trophy record beating the previous best by 1 shot.

First Lady

In the First Lady Net competition Dale Gilkes led the way with a net 60. Dale did not play the subsequent rounds and that meant there were 4 players within 2 shots of the lead at the end of Round 1. Anna's 66 in Round 2 gave her a 2 shot lead over Kate (70) going into the last round. The upset was on. More on Player's Personal Liability Insurance

Golf Australia provide to members of affiliated clubs personal liability insurance. SGC is an affiliated club, so you are covered by this insurance.

The current policy covers the legal liability that members may incur while playing or practicing golf. It covers injury or damage you may cause to someone else or their property which you have been found to have caused.

The policy does not cover:

- 3rd party damage or injury caused by a non-member
- Damage to, or loss of, a member's own equipment
- A member's own personal injuries sustained on a golf course.
- Damage you may cause to a cart that you own, hire or borrow
- Actions that are deliberate that cause damage or injury, that are determined to be because
 of your wilful conduct.

If you have reason to make a claim, please contact the club secretary, Colin Hockley, to proceed.

The Hole in One Page- at the double!

Remarkably not only have two holes in one been scored in SGC competitions since our last newsletter but member Mark Smith(r) has made two aces in the last 6 months! On the same hole!

Ace No. One

Mark's double aces occurred on the ninth hole. His most recent was with the hole measuring 130m to a left-hand flag – a perfect distance for Mark's 8 iron. Here's Mark's description of what happened next:

"It felt good off the club and landed close to the hole. I thought it had disappeared hopefully in the hole but none of us was sure it had. I admit to walking ahead of my fellow golfers and got excited when I couldn't see the ball above ground. Apologies to the group on the tee while we fumbled with my phone to get a photo. It is my lucky hole as this one followed a hole in one I had back in late September last year"



Ace No. Two

Earlier in March Dale Barrett knocked in the first ever ace on the 12th hole in SGC competitions. First on the 12th and a first for Dale. Here's his description:

"In terms of the shot, I was hitting into a reasonably health breeze, with tee markers towards the back. I hit a 7 iron and tried to keep it lower than the typical trajectory. The ball landed about 5 metres short of the green....then kept rolling and rolling...and like a magnet, the ball was drawn to and eventually just fell into the hole. Pandemonium then erupted - people on the 15th tee probably heard us going a bit crazy!

It was quite strange to watch - from about 2-3 seconds out, the only place it was going to finish was in the hole! Watching it happen was almost slow motion.

I was totally over the moon, but somewhat shocked too. Having never had a hole in one before, having played onand-off for about 4 decades, I said to my playing partners at the time: "I can die a happy man now!"

That's a bit drastic Dale! There's no need for that!

It's Masters time!

The US Masters takes place this year from 10-13 April.

As tradition dictates last year's winner Scottie Scheffler will host a past champions dinner before the tournament. He will also get to choose/design the menu for the dinner.

This year's menu is strongly influenced by Scheffler's home state of Texas and has a lot of similarities to his first menu from 2 years ago. Here's his 2023 offering. Items in italics are on both menus

Cheeseburger Sliders (served Scottie style) and Firecracker Shrimp with Sweet Thai Chilli and Sriracha Mayo appetizers; Tortilla Soup – Avocado, Crispy Blue Tortilla Strips, Sour Cream, Cilantro, Lime, to start; Main course of Texas Ribeye Steak or Blackened Redfish served with Family Style Mac and Cheese, Jalapeno Creamed Corn, Fried Brussels Sprouts, Seasoned Fries; Warm Chocolate Chip Skillet Cookie with Milk and Cookies Ice Cream for dessert.



Whilst this year's menu might lack a little imagination one of the most famous Master's menus was when Tiger Woods won his first Masters in 1997 his menu was "Cheeseburgers, chicken sandwiches, French fries, milkshakes." He was only 22!

This came after Fuzzy Zoeller(r) a previous winner made a comment to the media after Tiger's win:

Zoeller told reporters: "That little boy is driving well and he's putting well. You know what you guys do when he gets in here? You pat him on the back and say congratulations and enjoy it and tell him not to serve fried chicken next year. Got it. Or collard greens, or whatever the hell they serve."

The remark was considered to be based in racist stereotypes and cost Zoeller financially in the form of several cancelled sponsorship deals, and personally in the form of damage to his reputation. Zoeller apologized publicly and to Woods but it took several years for the controversy to die down.



This year's Champions dinner will probably come under scrutiny more for how PGA and LIV players will get along than for what's on the table.

The tree on the 6th hole at Sawgrass

Last issue we had a story on TPC Sawgrass and its designers Pete and Alice Dye. The story focused on the 17th hole island green as it is seen as Sawgrass' iconic hole. At this year's recently concluded event it was another hole that caught player's attention. The 6th hole is a 359m Par 4 with water left and trees right. As originally designed by Dye the tee shot was affected (at least mentally) by an oak tree (r) to the right and in front of the tee. As time passed the tree got older and diseased and eventually it was removed in 2014.





Recent renovations have

been aimed at restoring some of Dye's original intent. So under the guidance of Davis Love III an oak tree growing about 100m away in the woods was lifted and moved(I) to return some of the visual intimidation of the original hole. It sits some 30m in front of the back tee box. Suffice to say many players did not like it!

The process of moving the tree involved rolling the tree on inflatable tubes and is documented on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zEf_2y48om0

The root ball was 13m in diameter and the tree was estimated to weigh over 23,000kgs.

The finished product(r) certainly impacted the scoring on the 6th. The number of birdies was 26 fewer than the year before and the percentage of pars was the lowest since 2011. A win for the designers.

Matthew Fitzpatrick said it's "the dumbest tree I've ever seen. ... whose brilliant idea was it to bring this tree back? If someone could remove it, that would be great."

Others thought it wasn't really in play but that it was a visual menace. Judge for yourself.



Does Sandy have an iconic tree?

This discussion got us thinking. Is there an iconic tree at Sandy? Here are some candidates.



The pine on the 6th. Most of us have encountered this one.



The oaks alongside the 7th green and in front of the 8th tee. The acorns are a seasonal menace and from the back tee many a ball has been caught.



This tree between the 4th tee and the 9th green has the look of the Sawgrass tree but is not in play



The tree on the left of 15th tee seems to attract balls when it doesn't need to.

The quiet schism in Australian golf

Every time we drive into Sandy Golf Links we are made aware of the house that Dan built as the seat of power for golf in Australia. Golf Australia and the PGA of Australia duly took up residence in the Australian Golf Centre and you would be forgiven in thinking that all was unity and harmony across golf in Australia. Not quite!

As well as a national home Golf Australia has been trying to put in place a centralised



model (OneGolf) where Golf Australia and its member associations (the states) work together as a single organisation with top-down control from an operational point of view. The model includes a "centralised revenue process and associated reporting lines, with a single organisational brand to be adopted nationally". When Golf WA signed onto the national model in August 2024 there was only one state left on the outer – Golf NSW.

An article in Australian Golf Digest in October 2024 has an interview with Michael Medway, the Chairman of Golf NSW which seems to indicate they aren't coming into the fold any time soon.

"We're doing a whole lot of things in the sport that we don't see the national body doing."

The article provides a platform for Medway to enumerate the ways Golf NSW is doing better on its own (\$800k sponsorship for the NSW Open, LET co-sanctioned Ladies tournaments etc.) and to take pot shots at Golf Australia (85 staff, high turnover) and Victoria (Vic Open dying on the vine and VicGolf in a worse state.). He has ruled out any discussion of joining OneGolf.

Some of his claims are fact checked in the article e.g. Medway claims that NSW is more than 50% of the sport whereas a GA survey showed them at 33.1%. Despite this the article generally takes the Golf NSW perspective (it is an interview after all) but the national bodies are given a chance to respond at the end. As you might expect the response is of a generic, don't rock the boat type.

"A once fragmented golf community is more aligned and united than ever in its aspirations for golf in Australia. The strong alliance between our respective bodies is unique, and given the progress of recent years, provides us with great confidence as we accelerate our ambitions to see more Australians playing and engaging with golf."

To be fair Medway also says the relationship is the best it has been.

At Fairway News we are no experts in these matters but there seems to be more than a whiff of other NSW vs the rest issues such as the NRL and Racing NSW's bid to position themselves at the centre of sport in Australia.

Respect for other Clubs that use the Course.

There are several Golf Clubs that, like us, use Sandy Golf Links as their home course. Again, like us, course management gives them access to the booking sheet two days in advance of the public. These Clubs have been long term users of the course and have long histories. Indeed, one of them – the Sandringham Golf Club Associates was an offshoot of our Club way back in 1938. You can see their logos on the wall in café beautifully crafted by SGC member Mike Roker.

Just as our Club's main competition day is Saturday each of these Clubs has a competition day during the week. They play in the mornings and the field size varies between clubs.

If you use our advanced access to book a time during these Clubs normal competition window your tee time will likely be moved by course management and your 10 day access may be rescinded.

Please respect our fellow Clubs by not booking into their competition windows.

If you want to play adjacent to these times, it would be advisable to coordinate with the other clubs or wait until they have completed their team bookings and make your booking just prior to the public gaining access.

Course management has asked the Club to pass on the following message to members:

"Members of Sandringham Golf Club have access to book in at Sandy Golf Links with your group 10 days prior to your tee time (opens at 8pm online). Please note that this access is given to all club members on the proviso that you are booking only during the times your club plays and not in the times that the other clubs that are based here play. If they fail to adhere to the beforementioned member booking rules, we will have no choice but to immediately remove their 10-day advanced booking privileges."
